The New York Dance and Performance Awards, aka The Bessies, will take place on Monday October 24, 2011 at 8 pm at the legendary Apollo Theater in New York City.

This year, for the first time, the Bessies will announce the final works to be considered for Bessie Awards.

The Bessies are introducing an entirely new Juried Bessie Award to be chosen by a jury of acclaimed choreographers and to come with touring opportunities. The Bessies have secured the award's first regional touring partner.

"The Bessie Awards are taking a giant leap forward," says Lane Harwell, Director of Dance/NYC and Chair of the Bessie Steering Committee. "The scale and reach of this year's ceremony, and the range of artists represented, demonstrate the vitality and promise of dance in New York City."

The Bessies at The Apollo

The Bessie Awards are very excited to announce that this year's award ceremony will be held at one of the country's most renowned and storied venues—Harlem's Apollo Theater. To be presented in collaboration with the Apollo, the 2011 Bessie ceremony will be a true gathering of the city's diverse and ever-expanding community of dancers.

The landmarked Apollo Theater has played a pivotal role in American culture since the 1930s. The Apollo's signature Amateur Night talent competition is known around the world, and its legacy of launching and nurturing talent and presenting seminal music, dance, and entertainment performances is unparalleled.

Lucy Sexton, Producer of The Bessie Awards, says, "The Bessies are honored to be presenting the awards at this historic and vital venue. By coming to the Apollo, we really feel the Bessies are stepping out as a citywide celebration of dance. One of the imperatives of the Bessies is to provide increased visibility for our honored dance artists, so to present them at a theater that is known the world over really helps us put dance forward on the national and international stage. And the fact that it is such a dynamic performance space, one with a real community feel, is the icing on the cake. I couldn't think of a more exciting place for the Bessies to happen."

"From the famous Apollo chorus dancers to Honi Coles to Sammy Davis Jr. to Savion Glover, dance has been a cornerstone of the Apollo's artistic offerings since the theater opened its doors in 1934," said Apollo Theater Executive Producer Mikki Shepard. "We are thrilled to expand our connections to the dance community through this new partnership with the Bessies, and look forward to sharing our own exciting new dance programming with the public in the coming seasons."

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Juried Bessie Award

This is an entirely new award, chosen in an entirely new way. A jury of three acclaimed choreographers will choose an artist or company whose work they feel exhibits the most interesting and exciting ideas happening in dance in New York City today. The honored dance maker will then tour their work to one or more regional theaters. The inaugural jury is David Gordon, Ralph Lemon, and Elizabeth Streb.

The Nazareth College Arts Center Dance Festival is the inaugural touring partner for the Juried Bessie Award. The honored artist will be invited to perform at the 2012 festival at the Nazareth College Arts Center in Rochester, NY. Nazareth College President Daan Braveman says, "The Nazareth College Arts Center has a long history of presenting renowned and diverse---dance companies on our stage. It is an honor to be the inaugural touring partner for the new Juried Bessie Award, and we look forward to introducing Rochester-area audiences to the artist or company selected for this prestigious recognition."

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About the Bessie Awards

The mission of the Bessie Awards is to gather the city's many dance communities, to honor outstanding work in the field of dance, and to advocate on the national and international stage for the extraordinary range of dance being performed in New York.

Established in 1983 by David White at Dance Theater Workshop, the New York Dance and Performance Awards or Bessie Awards---in honor of the treasured dancer and teacher Bessie Schonberg--- acknowledge outstanding creative work by independent artists in the fields of dance and related performance in New York City. They honor exceptional choreography, performance, music composition, visual design and others areas of dance and performance. The award recipients are chosen by The Bessie Selection Committee, which consists of artists, dance presenters, producers, journalists, critics and academics.
